

Congenital heart disease transition of care tip sheet

Congenital heart disease (CHD) is any defects in the heart valves, great vessels, heart muscle or chambers of the heart that are present at birth.



Many people with CHD require lifelong expert medical care, and can expect to lead physical and mental health challenges!



There are now many adults with CHD from childhood, thanks to medical and surgical advances in care!

Making the transition to adult congenital heart disease care

Transition is a process that begins in the early teenage years and continues through every adulthood. The transition from pediatric care providers to an adult congenital cardiologist will likely happen around age 18. As part of the transition, you will want to be more responsible for your own health and health decisions.

Where will I be transferred to?

Degree	Examples	Who should you talk about your heart??
Simple	-Infrequent doctor visits -Physician visit for acute or non-emergencies	Even simple CHD can have complications. The adult cardiologist will decide if it's suitable for you to see them. They might refer you to a general cardiologist or community cardiologist who has expertise in your specific type of congenital heart defect.
Moderate	-Occasional office visits -Office visits for long-term follow-up	
Complex	-High frequency of office visits -Transposition of the great arteries with CHD complications or repair -Any type of congenital heart disease that requires continuous monitoring or long term follow-up because more frequent monitoring is required by the cardiologist -Complex anomalies still exist	You will be seeing an adult CHD specialist all or most of the time if CHD is complex.

Steps to take for a successful transition

- Talk to your healthcare team about transitioning to adult care and next steps.
- If you need to choose a different primary healthcare provider, ask your cardiologist if they can recommend a provider who has other CHD patients.
- Keep a health passport with you. This is a summary of your own medical information including the names and phone numbers of your cardiologist, your diagnosis and any treatments, and medications.
- Ask questions. Learn about your condition.
- Be sure that members of your adult care team seem interested in working with people like you. It's a good idea to talk about your concerns with the people you trust, including your health care team.
